The Planning Commission convened in-person within the Osborne Room inside of the Bloomington Police Department at 4:00 p.m., Wednesday, March 2, 2022, with the following physically present staff members Mr. George Boyle, Assistant Corporation Counsel; Mr. Glen Wetterow, City Planner; Mr. Jon Branham, City Planner; Ms. Alissa Pemberton, Assistant City Planner; Ms. Kimberly Smith, Assistant Economic and Community Development Director; Genevieve Rappold, Stephenson Fellow; and Craig Shonkwiler, City Engineer.

The meeting was called to order by Chairperson Mohr at 4:00 p.m.

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Mr. Wetterow called the roll. There was a quorum present.

PUBLIC COMMENT

None.

MINUTES

Mr. Krieger motioned to approve the minutes from the March 2, 2022 meeting. Mr. Boyd seconded. Roll call vote: Mr. Boyd - Yes, Mr. Krieger - Yes, Mr. Muehleck - Yes, Mr. Danenberger - Yes, Mr. Muncy Mr. Galpalli - Yes, Ms. Patino - Yes Chairperson Mohr - Yes. (8-0). The minutes were approved.

No Discussion.

Chair Mohr addressed the request to Table Item 5G (1101 Bell St - Map Amendment). Mr. Muncy made a motion to table item 5G to the next regular meeting, Mr. Kreiger seconded. Voice vote (8-0). The motion passed.

Chair Mohr reminded the public of the intent and protocol for Planning Commission meetings. He stated the primary intent of this meeting is to hold a public hearing and make recommendation on cases. Attendees should address comments directly to the Commission. He stated comments may include questions which the Commission may or may not direct to staff or the petitioner to address. He stated attendees should not speak unless recognized, and not to address comments directly to the petitioners.

REGULAR AGENDA

A. PR-01-22 Public hearing, review and action on a request by John Pratt, Attorney, on behalf of QuikTrip Corporation, for Legislative Site Plan Review, with potential Variances, for property located on a tract of land being part of Lots 1-5, 9-10 and 21-23 and All Lots 6-8 and 11-16 C. A. Nafziger's Subdivision being part of the Northwest quarter of Section 6, Township 23 North, Range 2 East of the Third Principal Meridian in McLean County, Illinois (PINs: 21-06-102 003 and 21-06-102-004).

City Staff Jon Branham presented the staff report, with a recommendation for approval.

Mr. Boyd asked if sidewalks were included as part of this project and for staff to indicate them on the site plan. Mr. Branham indicated they are a part of the project and indicated where they are located on the site plan.

The petitioner, John Pratt (attorney for QuikTrip), 217 E Washington St, Bloomington IL introduced himself and Ms. Gwen Keen.

Mr. Pratt thanked the Commission for hearing the case this evening, and for their attentiveness and consideration during the last meeting. He emphasized how much planning has occurred for the subject property and project, including Illinois Department of Transportation and City staff.

Mr. Pratt emphasized that no variances were requested because they worked diligently with City staff to ensure everything met the Code and is compatible with the Comprehensive Plan. He noted that the one adjacent residence is owned by QuikTrip at this time, and residences to the south are buffered by a large agricultural area. He also highlighted that QuikTrip is adding public sewer, improving streets, sidewalks, and pedestrian crossings.

Gwen Keen - 2255 Bluestone, St. Charles, MO. Ms. Keen echoed Mr. Pratt's comments and noted her appreciation for the feedback from staff and the community. She stated QuikTrip has now officially purchased the property and is looking forward to being part of the community. She apologized to the community for the litter issue brought up during the last meeting. She stated she drove by the property after last month's meeting and noted that trash had begun to accumulate. She said they are now partnering with Bloomington Apostolic Church to maintain the site.

Steve Stallard - 122 Bloomington Heights Road. Mr. Stallard stated he had concerns about overnight truck parking. He also expressed his concern regarding buffering. He expressed his concern for how busy the lot could be during the winter when the roads were not safe to travel. He was concerned the site plan changed since the last meeting.

Ms. Keen clarified that the site plan has not changed since the last meeting. She stated they have no intent to allow overnight parking. She stated they do need to have truck parking on site for customers, but the number is significantly less than similar businesses in the area. She stated employees would be responsible for monitoring. She highlighted how the property will be fully landscaped and areas most adjacent to the neighborhoods will be fenced and landscaped.

Denise Balagna - 2020 Interurban Road. Ms. Balagna stated that she did not receive a meeting notification. She had questions regarding color lines identified on the site plan. She also inquired about the camper station and power wash tubing identified on the site plan. She also wanted to know how trucks will utilize the facility. She inquired about a timeline for the project and when sidewalks would be added.

Mr. Wetterow responded that the lines are utility lines.

Chair Mohr asked staff or the petitioner to address the questions regarding traffic flow.

Ms. Keen stated access from Market Street has been designed as a right-in,-right-out for smaller vehicles. She said truck circulation should use the signals which encourages them to go onto JC Parkway and Wylie Drive as they are signaled. She stated a camper station is tied in directly with sanitary sewer line so RVs can dump, if needed. She stated power washer

tubing is used to clean the property. She stated a new signal at Wylie Drive and Bloomington Heights Road was not warranted, per the traffic study.

Shannon Ramirez - 2020 Interurban Road. Ms. Ramirez stated that she did not believe this area needs another fueling station or additional convenience store. She stated she would like to see signage indicating limited parking times allowed for trucks. She inquired about stormwater detention. She had questions related to a proposed highway sign and if a variance would be required. She requested that 10 additional evergreen plantings be added along the south edge of the property to increase buffering.

Ms. Keen agreed to add evergreen plantings but stated it would have to work in conjunction with the detention system.

Beverly Bell - 105 N Adelaide St., Normal, IL. Ms. Bell expressed her extreme frustration with the process and feels that the public has not been provided answers to many of the questions asked. She requested a wall be installed to screen the property from neighboring properties, and that the soil be adequately graded to prevent flooding on the adjacent properties. She asked for a lake pond to be created so that the water will gather in it, in order to be treated because she has concerns regarding potential contamination from the fuel from QuikTrip.

Chair Mohr asked the speaker to limit comments to the site plan and to not address the petitioner directly.

Ms. Keen thanked the Commission for their time and diligence and noted that the reports provided state that QuikTrip has met all of the requirements and complied with all of the provisions. She stated the site plan has not changed since it was presented at the last meeting.

Robert Blessing - 114 Constantine St. Mr. Blessing stated he is concerned about the value of his home no that it is directly adjacent to a truck stop. He inquired how long the trucks would be permitted to park in the parking area and he inquired about the maintenance of Bloomington Heights Road.

Ms. Keen noted that while it was not included in the packet from the last meeting, the site plan was reviewed during her presentation.

Chair Mohr noted that previous presentations at the last meeting indicated that employees would be responsible for monitoring the site and parking issues and asked for clarification on the maintenance of Bloomington Heights Road.

Craig Shonkwiler, City Engineer stated there was a 2004 jurisdictional transfer of Bloomington Heights Road from the County to the City. He stated the City is responsible for the maintenance of the road.

Chair Mohr closed the public hearing.

There was no discussion by the Commission.

A motion to establish findings of fact that the subject property meets the legislative site plan criteria in Chapter 44.17-9 of the City Code was made by Mr. Boyd and seconded by Mr. Krieger. Roll call vote: Mr. Boyd - Yes, Mr. Krieger - Yes, Mr. Muehleck - Yes, Mr. Danenberger - Yes, Mr. Muncy Mr. Galpalli - Yes, Ms. Patino - Yes Chairperson Mohr - Yes. (8-0) Motion passed.

A motion to recommend that City Council approve a Site Plan for a Vehicle Fueling Station in the B-1 (General Commercial) District for the property located on a tract of land being part of Lots 1-5, 9-10 and 21-23 and All Lots 6-8 and 11-16 C. A. Nafziger's Subdivision being part of the Northwest quarter of Section 6, Township 23 North, Range 2 East of the Third Principal Meridian in McLean County, Illinois (PIN: 21-06-102-003 and 21-06-102-004) was made by Mr. Boyd with additional consideration that Council makes a recommendation for "No Overnight Parking" signs, seconded by Ms. Patino.

Mr. Galpalli recommended amending the motion to require a sign limiting parking to a certain number of hours, rather than overnight. Seconded by Mr. Muehleck.

Discussion: Mr. Boyd would rather not put a certain number of hours' time-limit sign, but to recommend Council consider a sign after working with staff.

Vote on amendment to original motion. Roll call vote: Mr. Boyd - No, Mr. Krieger - No, Mr. Muehleck - Yes, Mr. Danenberger - No, Mr. Muncy Mr. Galpalli - Yes, Ms. Patino - No Chairperson Mohr - No. (3-5). The amended motion did not pass.

Chairperson Mohr brought the original motion back before the Commission for a vote. Roll call vote: Mr. Boyd - Yes, Mr. Krieger - Yes, Mr. Muehleck - Yes, Mr. Danenberger - Yes, Mr. Muncy Mr. Galpalli - Yes, Ms. Patino - Yes, Chairperson Mohr - Yes. (8-0) The original motion passed.

B. Z-05-22 Public hearing, review and action on a request submitted by Nathan Hinch, Attorney, on behalf of Sale Barn Properties LLC, for an Annexation Agreement with Zoning Map Amendment, for property generally located north of the 400 block of West Hamilton and west of Main Street; and described as located on part of Lots 1, 2, 3 and 4 in School Commissioners Subdivision of the SW1/4 of Section 16, together with parts of lots 13, 14 and 15 in School Commissioners Subdivision of the NW1/4 of Section 16, all in Township 23 North, Range 2 East of the Third Principal Meridian, McLean County, Illinois.

C. PR-02-22 Public hearing, review and action on a request submitted by Nathan Hinch, Attorney, on behalf of Sale Barn Properties LLC, for Legislative Site Plan Review with potential Variances, for property generally located north of the 400 block of West Hamilton and west of Main Street; and described as located on part of Lots 1, 2, 3 and 4 in School Commissioners Subdivision of the SW1/4 of Section 16, together with parts of lots 13, 14 and 15 in School Commissioners Subdivision of the NW1/4 of Section 16, all in Township 23 North, Range 2 East of the Third Principal Meridian, McLean County, Illinois.

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Chair Mohr requested that cases Z-05-22 and PR-02-22 be reviewed together, for clarity and time. There were no objections.

City Staff Glen Wetterow presented the staff report for Z-05-22 with a recommendation for approval.

City Staff Jon Branham presented the staff report for PR-02-22 with a recommendation for approval. He noted additional recreational requirements related to fencing children's play areas, and minimum lot area and width, have all been met. Mr. Branham stated there is one variance related to interior parking lot landscaping islands due to the lot material that has already been approved.

Mr. Boyd inquired about sidewalk locations. Additionally, he inquired if bicycle parking was included in the plan.

Mr. Branham indicated existing and proposed sidewalks and stated the Constitution Trail near the site will be maintained. He deferred to the petitioner on bicycle parking as it was not identified on the site plan.

Chairperson Mohr opened public hearing.

Jeremy Kelley - 904 Fairchild Ave., Normal, IL. Mr. Kelley, representing Prairie Cities Soccer League, noted there are approximately 2,000 children playing soccer in their club. He stated the league is losing their current field, located near the airport, as their lease is up at the end of this year; they have been working with Sale Barn to lease or lease-to-own since they cannot currently afford to purchase outright. He stated they have been working with the community, including holding an open house to review the proposal with neighbors. He stated many of the concerns expressed at that meeting are shared by the League and are being addressed. Regarding the concern of noise pollution: they will not be having major tournaments at this site; tournaments have been moved to Rantoul. This location is a place for the club to have for practice, train and have League games. The primary focus of use will be on team training which will occur around 5:30-9:30pm, and then there will be games on the weekends (this is similar how they operate at Community Fields.) Regarding stormwater runoff: the water flows towards the lake to the north, and the property drains to a drop box that feeds the lake. Mr. Kelley stated that the goal is to capture water and use it for irrigation to water the onsite turf. He noted the restrooms and concessions will use City water. Regarding access: he stated an existing vehicle access point on Hamilton Road will be utilized, and that they have no intent to utilize access from Timberlake Road. He also stated they will be supplementing trees along the west property edge, and posting "no parking" signs to deter parking in that area. He stated the intent is to centralize activities and keep them away from residential areas as much as possible. He stated bike parking has been added for people coming in from Constitution Trail to the site.

Mr. Galpalli asked if there are plans to place trees in the front along Hamilton Road.

Mr. Kelley noted the green areas on the plan are the landscaped areas, and also that the trees will serve as a wind and soccer ball break. These are beneficial to the site and the neighbors.

Mr. Kelley reemphasized that full tournaments will not be able to occur at the location due to size and noted the middle road is extra wide to allow for emergency vehicles and accessibility parking near the concession area.

Chair Mohr asked for additional information on the chip and tar parking material and what infrastructure was being built that the City would have a responsibility to maintain.

Mr. Kelley stated the water main would be maintained by City but would be installed at their expense. He stated the rest of the infrastructure is internal to site and would be privately maintained. He stated the surrounding sidewalks are existing. He added he would have to defer to his engineer regarding the proposed parking lot material.

Chairperson Mohr asked if any incentives were being provided by the City.

Mr. Kelley states this is a private project, and no incentives were requested. He stated the annexation fees have been waived as they are a nonprofit organization, and this is routine for the City to do for nonprofit organizations. He stated the tap-on fees were already addressed by the property owner when Hamilton Road was constructed.

Mr. Danenberger asked for clarification on the stormwater plan and details regarding the property that is not being annexed.

Mr. Kelley explained Mr. Shirk intends to keep both areas as is, or hand them over to the City for future development and management. There will be an easement for access so the retention basin is not land-locked.

Mr. Mohr asked about property maintenance, given the large number of visitors throughout the week.

Mr. Kelley explained that they have contracts for grass mowing and waste management, and that their teams like their facilities to remain clean.

David Brown - 505 N Main St. Mr. Brown, representing Prairie Cities Soccer League (PCSL), as designer of the site plan. He stated chip and tar is liquid asphalt and small aggregate stone that is applied in layers. He said it is commonly used in rural areas. It creates a dust-free surface and reduces maintenance compared to non-managed surfaces like turf.

Chairperson Mohr asked if the material is pervious. Mr. Brown stated is not a pervious surface.

Mr. Boyd inquired about any negatives regarding the use of that type of material. Mr. Brown explained the downside might be that it needs reapplication every 3-5 years, whereas a conventional asphalt or concrete would be more durable long-term.

Chris Granning - 22 Timberlake Rd. Mr. Granning thanked Mr. Kelley for already addressing many of the concerns he has; he stated he still had concerns about the B-1 zoning designation. He stated he was also concerned about what happens if PCSL goes under or the lease expires. He said stormwater management is still a concern. He had additional questions related to noise, light pollution, traffic, and litter. He stated he would like to recommend that lights not be able to be on past 9:00 p.m. He inquired if the variance was a common request. He reemphasized his primary concern is related to the B-1 zoning.

Chair Mohr asked City Staff to address the B-1 zoning designation and the variance item.

Mr. Wetterow discussed how the proposed B-1 zoning aligned with the City's Comprehensive Plan. He noted that this type of use would not be permitted in residential zoning and required commercial zoning. Additionally, he noted that a Legislative Site Plan Review is a benefit of commercial projects, which would not be the case in other zoning districts, so if PCSL were to leave, there would be additional review of future development on the site, because of the B-1 zoning. He stated variances for parking lot items are not uncommon. He indicated there was another similar request on a different case this later in this meeting.

Chair Mohr noted that there is an entire page of City Code dedicated to lighting of which they will need to comply.

Mr. Branham added they will be required to submit photometric plan that indicated acceptable levels of footcandle measurement at the property lines.

Mr. Kelley state they are looking at directional LEDs that will contain the light to the property. He stated typically teams would practice until no later than 9:30pm. He added the location of the lights are only for the artificial turf fields and two existing fields in the center of the site.

Mr. Brown stated the range of parking recommend for this type of use is 60-90 spaces per field. He stated this is an industry standard; the City does not have a standard for this type of use.

Commissioner Krieger left the meeting at 5:26 pm.

Lynn Weber - 601 W Hamilton Rd. Mr. Weber stated he purchased his residence due to the proximity to agricultural property. He stated the Comprehensive Plan for McLean County identifies this property as low to medium density residential. He stated he was concerned about field elevation and the potential of items rolling downhill onto his property. He inquired if lights will be on during parts of the year when it is not in use. He also inquired if there be a gate at the entrance of the parking lot to keep people out when the site is not in use.

Chair Mohr asked petitioner to address the questions provided by Mr. Weber.

Dale Kelley - 24739 E 800 North Rd. Mr. D. Kelley stated lighting levels at the soccer field are based on a low elevation above the field as to focus on the ball in play. He stated lighting levels will be contained to the walkways and the fields themselves and demonstrated on the site plan where lights would be placed. He stated the focus of use will be the interior synthetic fields.

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He stated they want to control access of the facility when not in use and a gate or some other means to prevent access will be provided. He stated dumpster truck access will be done in concrete for access and will be gated when not in use. He reiterated plans for addressing water, bicycle parking, and screening that have been identified by others.

Mr. Galpalli inquired about traffic flow and whether traffic could turn left or right when exiting.

Mr. D. Kelley stated the plan is to have a one-way entry and one-way exit with the option to turn left or right onto Hamilton Road for exiting.

Mr. Muncy asked for clarification regarding emergency vehicles if there was an accident at the entry.

Mr. J. Kelley explained they would encourage patrons to exit the facility by turning right on Hamilton Rd, out to Morris Street and/or Veterans Parkway. He stated there is also an exit via Main Street at northeast corner of site that could be used, if necessary, in an emergency.

Gay Dolan - 21 Timberlake Rd. Ms. Dolan stated she had walked the site in its current condition and frequently has picked up a lot of empty cans and water bottles. She expressed concerns about alcohol use and litter at the property.

Mr. J. Kelly noted that currently the fields are managed by the City, and they would expect those items to be controlled in the future.

Ernie Anderson - 12 Hidden Lake Ct. Mr. Anderson stated concerns with parking and access. He stated the amount of traffic that will be exiting onto Hamilton Road near the intersection is concerning. He is hoping a restriction can be placed on hours of operation so that the facility cannot be used after 10pm. He shared concerns about lighting issues, and what could happen in the future with regard the B-1 zoning.

Lynn Weber - 601 W Hamilton Rd - Mr. Weber inquired if chip and tar material will track onto Hamilton Road. Additionally, he requested a berm be extended between the existing berms to help control children and equipment.

Mr. J. Kelley clarified that the site topography is currently higher in southwest corner and sloping toward northeast corner and will continue to function in that manner.

Chair Mohr closed the public.

Mr. Boyd made a motion to take a recess. Mr. Muncy seconded. Voice vote (7-0).

The Planning Commission recessed at 5:43pm.

Chair Mohr called the meeting back to order at 5:50pm.

A motion to recommend approval of the petition submitted by Nathan Hinch, Attorney, on behalf of Sale Barn Properties LLC, for an Annexation Agreement with Map Amendment, for

property generally located on part of Lots 1, 2, 3 and 4 in School Commissioners Subdivision of the SW1/4 of Section 16, together with parts of lots 13, 14 and 15 in School Commissioners Subdivision of the NW1/4 of Section 16, all in Township 23 North, Range 2 East of the Third Principal Meridian, McLean County, Illinois was made by Mr. Boyd and seconded by Mr. Muncy.

Mr. Boyd noted that the Commission has seen a couple annexations in last couple months, which has not been the norm in recent years, and is not something taken lightly, but this property is surrounded, and with the intended use, it is a benefit for the City.

Chair Mohr stated that he was opposed to the last annexation due to level of infrastructure associated, but this case does not share that issue, so he will be supporting it.

Roll call vote: Mr. Boyd - Yes, Mr. Muehleck - Yes, Mr. Danenberger - Yes, Mr. Muncy-Yes, Mr. Galpalli - Yes, Ms. Patino - Yes Chairperson Mohr - Yes. (7-0) Motion passed.

Mr. Boyd does have an issue with only having one entrance/exit on the one side; not a concern that will make him vote “no,” but is a concern that others have expressed as well.

The approval of this request is contingent upon the approval of the final plat and construction plans, annexation agreement, and annexation petition for the subject property.

A motion to establish findings of fact that the subject property meets the legislative site plan criteria in Chapter 44.17-9 of the City Code was made by Mr. Boyd and seconded by Mr. Danenberger.

Roll call vote: Mr. Boyd - Yes, Mr. Muehleck - Yes, Mr. Danenberger - Yes, Mr. Muncy Mr. Galpalli - Yes, Ms. Patino - Yes Chairperson Mohr - Yes. (7-0) Motion passed.

City Staff Glen Wetterow presented the staff report and indicated all standards have been met and concluded with a recommendation for approval.

Vice Chair Boyd opened the public hearing.

Todd Bugg - 800 Smith Drive, Normal, IL. Mr. Bugg, attorney for the petitioner, introduced Neil Finlen, Mike Hundman, Mark Fetzer of the project team who were also present. He explained that the project is planned for an ABC Supply, a roofing and building supplies company. He stated the petitioners have worked hard to reduce impacts to the adjacent properties; building and parking is concentrated to the south, away from the residential uses. He indicated truck traffic via Empire Street is not ideal due to the street median preventing exit options.

Mr. Muehleck inquired if Eastport Drive can accommodate truck traffic.

Mr. Bugg stated that the level of expected traffic is considered regular and it will not be the level such as you see at Bridgestone, which includes truck queuing.

Neil Finlen - 2709 McGraw Dr, Bloomington, IL - Mr. Finlen stated the reasoning for having access from Eastport Drive is because it is a signalized intersection with Empire Street, which helps safety. He stated he believes Eastport Drive could accommodate truck traffic but requested verification from the City Engineer.

Craig Shonkwiler, City Engineer, stated that access is an important consideration for safety and Eastport Drive is not residential at that point and should be able to handle the type of traffic proposed.

Dehn, Attorney, on behalf of Akshar Plastic requesting a zoning map amendment for property located at 1101 E Bell Street in the City of Bloomington, from M-1, Restricted Manufacturing District, to M-2, (General Manufacturing) District.

BACKGROUND

Petitioners' request:

The petitioner seeks a zoning map amendment for the subject property from M-1, (Restricted Manufacturing) District, to M-2, (General Manufacturing) District to allow for a Recycling Facility use at the property. A Recycling Facility also requires a special use in the M-2 District, which would need to be obtained following a zoning change. The property is currently occupied by Akshar Plastic. The existing business has existed at the property for an extended time and the petitioner is seeking to align the use with acceptable zoning requirements.

Property Characteristics:

The subject property consists of 11.91 acres of land located at 1101 E Bell St. The property is located on the south side of E Bell St, between Indianapolis St and Hannah St. Multiple buildings and associated surface parking areas currently exist at the property.

Notice:

The application was filed in conformance with applicable procedural and public notice requirements. Notice was published in *The Pantagraph* on Monday, March 21, 2022. Courtesy notices were mailed to 132 property owners within 500 feet of the subject property.

ANALYSIS

*Comparison of Existing and Proposed Districts**

M-1 (Restricted Manufacturing) District: the intent of this M-1 Restricted Manufacturing District is to provide for industrial, warehouse, storage and transfer service uses with an absence of objectionable external effects in areas that are suitable for this type of development by reason of topography, relative location, and adequate utility and transportation systems. Compatibility with surrounding districts is further assured by limiting development to low industrial densities. Just as industrial uses are excluded from residential areas to promote public health, safety, and welfare, so are residential subdivision developments excluded from this district.

M-2 (General Manufacturing) District: the intent of this M-2 General Manufacturing District is to provide for the more intense types of industrial and manufacturing uses which generally exhibit higher levels of objectionable external effects. This district should not be located adjacent to residential districts, and its contiguity to commercial and business areas should, wherever possible, be avoided. Uses permitted in this district will provide for those basic industries needed to expand employment opportunities within the City.

**A list of permitted uses for manufacturing districts can be found online in [Chapter 44, Divisions 5-2 and 4-2](#) respectively.*

Compliance with the Comprehensive Plan

Zoning map amendment requests should be consistent with the Comprehensive Plan. The 2035 Comprehensive Plan's Future Land Use map identifies this section of E Bell St as Mixed Use. The Land Use Priorities map identifies this area as a Tier 1 priority area.

The proposed M-2 zoning map amendment supports the following Comprehensive Plan goals:

- H-2. Ensure reinvestment in the established older neighborhoods and compact development of the City.
- ED-1.1. Focus on retention and expansion of existing businesses.

STANDARDS FOR REVIEW

As indicated in Ch. 44, 17-6 Zoning Map (rezoning) and text amendments, the Planning Commission shall be guided by those purposes, standards, and objectives of this Code and shall not recommend the adoption of any amendment unless it finds that such amendment is in the public interest and not solely for the benefit of the applicant.

Standards for Consideration of Rezoning

Standard: the suitability of the subject property for uses authorized by the existing zoning.

The existing zoning is suitable to the site as it has been successfully occupied by other businesses over the past several years. **Standard is met.**

Standard: the length of time the property has remained vacant as zoned considered in the context of land development in the area.

The property has not been vacant. The zoning map amendment would allow for a heavy manufacturing use activity at the site to continue to operate with full zoning compliance. **Standard is not met.**

Standard: the suitability of the subject property for uses authorized by the proposed zoning.
The subject property is adjacent to residential areas. The zoning ordinance states the M-2 district should not be located adjacent to residential districts. **Standard is not met.**

Standard: the existing land uses and zoning of nearby property.
The subject property is surrounded by manufacturing, business and residential uses. **Standard is not met.**

Standard: relative gain or hardship to the public as contrasted and compared to the hardship or gain of the individual property owner resulting from the approval or denial of the zoning amendment application.
The map amendment would create a hardship to adjacent properties which does not provide a relative gain to the public. **Standard is not met.**

Standard: the extent to which adequate streets are connected to the arterial street system and are available or can be reasonably supplied to serve the uses permitted in the proposed zoning classification.
The site has access to E Bell Street. **Standard is met.**

Standard: the extent to which the proposed amendment is inconsistent with the need to minimize flood damage and that the development of the subject property for the uses permitted in the proposed zoning classification will not have a substantial detrimental effect on the drainage patterns in the area.
The petitioner is not adjusting any drainage items at the property. **Standard is met.**

Standard: the extent to which adequate services (including but not limited to fire and police protection, schools, water supply, and sewage disposal facilities) are available or can be reasonably supplied to serve the uses permitted in the proposed zoning classification.
The site is currently served by existing water mains and sewer connections, as well as fire and police protection. **Standard is met.**

Standard: The extent to which the proposed amendment is consistent with the public interest, giving due consideration for the purpose and intent of this Code as set forth in § 44-1701 herein.
The map amendment provides limited public interest. **Standard is not met.**

Standard: the extent to which property values are diminished by the particular zoning restriction.
The zoning restrictions could affect property values. **Standard is not met.**

Standard: the extent to which the destruction of property values promotes the health, safety, morals, or general welfare of the public.
The potential destruction of property values associated with heavy manufacturing uses would not promote the health, safety, morals, or general welfare of the public. **Standard is not met.**

Standard: whether a Comprehensive Plan for land use and development exists, and whether the ordinance is in harmony with it.

The Comprehensive Plan's Future Land Use map identifies the subject property as mixed-use. The Land Use Priorities map identifies this area as Tier 1. **Standard is not met.**

Standard: whether the City needs the proposed use.

The proposed map amendment would allow an existing business and manufacturing-designed building to be occupied and serve the City locally. **Standard is met.**

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff finds that the application does not meet all the standards for a zoning map amendment and recommends that the Planning Commission take the following actions:

1. Motion to establish findings of fact, and that the proposed map amendment is not in the public interest and solely for the benefit of the petitioner.
2. Motion to not recommend approval of the petition submitted by Joseph A. Dehn, Attorney, on behalf of Akshar Plastic requesting a zoning map amendment for property located at 1101 E Bell Street in the City of Bloomington, from M-1, Restricted Manufacturing District, to M-2, General Manufacturing District. (P.I.N.: 21-10-105-007). (Ward 4)

BACKGROUND

Petitioners' request:

The petitioner is requesting a Legislative Site Plan Review (and Special Use) with a Variance, to develop a mini warehouse and vehicle rental service with an associated surface parking area at the subject property. Mini warehouse is identified as a Special Use in the B-1 (General Commercial) District. Vehicle rental service is identified as a permitted use in B-1 District but requires a Special Use if adjoining a residential boundary. The site will include two three-story buildings. The height of the buildings is proposed at 38 feet, 6 inches, which exceeds the 35-foot height requirement. The variance request is to allow the increased height.

Property Characteristics:

The subject property consists of roughly 4.08 acres of land located near the northeastern intersection of Veterans Parkway and Empire Street (IL Route 9) in Bloomington. The property was previously utilized as a bowling alley which has been vacant for several years. The surrounding properties consist of commercial and residential zoning districts. The surrounding uses also consist of commercial, office and residential uses.

Notice:

The application was filed in conformance with applicable procedural and public notice requirements. Notice was published in *The Pantagraph* on Monday, April 18, 2022. Courtesy notices were mailed to 64 property owners within 500 feet of the subject property.

ANALYSIS

Compliance with the Comprehensive Plan

The subject property is identified as Tier 1-Infill Redevelopment Priority. The Future Land Use map identifies the site as Regional Commercial. Approval of the Site Plan aligns with the following goals of the Comprehensive Plan:

- Goal N-1. Enhance the livability of all Bloomington neighborhoods.
- ED -4.2. Prioritize infill and redevelopment to spur growth and reinvestment in the City.

STANDARDS FOR REVIEW

Ch. 44, 17-9 Legislative site plan review

The Site Plan review process is intended to protect the public interest in safety, economy, and from adverse site development that may be detrimental to neighboring property owners and the surrounding area. The following standards and objectives shall guide the review of City staff, the Planning Commission, and the City Council in making a determination on the proposed Site Plan.

Standards for Consideration of Site Plan Review

Standard: the extent to which potential incompatibilities between the proposed development and surrounding existing development and/or zoning is minimized by such design features as placement of buildings, parking areas, access driveways and existing or proposed topography.

*The proposed development is not incompatible with the existing development in the area. The site design is consistent with other developments on surrounding properties in the direct area. The building will meet all bulk requirements for B-1 zoning. The parking lot meets the code requirements for off-street parking and loading. All landscaping requirements have been met. **Standard is met.***

Standard: the extent to which the proposal minimizes any adverse impact of the development upon adjoining land.

*The proposed use will not have any adverse impacts on the development of adjoining land. The use is a special use within the zoning and is compatible with the uses of the surrounding properties. The building and landscaping shall comply with code requirements. The trash enclosure shall be fully screened as City Code requires. **Standard is met.***

Standard: the extent to which adequately improved streets connected to the improved arterial street system are available or can be reasonably supplied to serve the uses proposed in the development.

*The site is accessible by and directly situated on Holiday Drive. All curb cuts and aprons at the site are existing and will meet code requirements. **Standard is met.***

Standard: the extent to which the proposed development will favorably or adversely affect other persons or property and, if so, whether because of circumstances peculiar to the location the effect is likely to be greater than is ordinarily associated with the development of the type proposed.

*The surrounding properties are all zoned commercial. The uses range from commercial, office, and residential. A mini warehouse at the proposed site would be complementary to the existing surrounding uses. **Standard is met.***

Ch. 44. 10-26, Mini warehouses, provides additional minimum site and bulk standards for the siting and development of any mini warehouse:

- A. Buffers and screening. In addition to the requirements of Article XIII of this Code, the following minimum buffers and screening shall be required.
 - (1) A six-foot high opaque fence shall be required around the perimeter of the lot to be used as a mini warehouse site.
 - (2) A chain link or wire mesh fence interlaced or interwoven with opaque strips may qualify as meeting the requirements for a solid opaque fence, if approved by the Zoning Administrator.
 - (3) A landscaping strip, 12 feet in width, shall be provided along all street frontages and along borders where a mini-warehouse site abuts any Residential District.
- B. Site circulation.
 - (1) All one-way driveways shall provide for one ten-foot-wide parking lane and one fifteen-foot-wide travel lane. Traffic direction and parking shall be designated by signing or painting.
 - (2) All two-way driveways shall provide for one ten-foot-wide parking lane and two twelve-foot travel lanes.
 - (3) The parking lanes may be eliminated when the driveway does not serve storage cubicles.
- C. Maximum floor area. No storage cubicle shall have a gross floor area greater than 5,000 square feet.
- D. Building height. The maximum permitted building height shall be 35 feet or two stories, whichever is lower.
- E. The following minimum site and bulk standards shall be required for the siting and development of any mini-warehouse facility.

Item D, Building height, has not been met as the applicant is proposing buildings with a height of 38 feet-6 inches, rather than the required 35-feet. All other standards have been met.

ADDITIONAL REQUESTS - SPECIAL USE

Ch 44, 17-9-D, Concurrent Applications

The applicant has requested a Special Use as part of the application, in accordance with Ch. 17, 17-9-D of the Site Plan Review process. Land uses proposed to be included in a development requiring a legislative public hearing site plan review which would otherwise be allowed by Special Use Permit only are exempted from the administrative public hearing normally required for such Special Use Permit applications and the Planning Commission shall consider the standards for granting a special use.

The requested special use, therefore, is subject to the standards for granting a special use (Chapter 44, 17-7).

Ch. 44, 17-7 Special uses.

For each Special Use application, the Board of Zoning Appeals shall report to the Council its findings of fact and recommendations, including the stipulations of additional conditions and guarantees, when they are deemed necessary for the protection of the public interest or to meet the standards as specified herein. No special use application shall be recommended by the Board of Zoning Appeals for approval unless all of the following factors are found:

Standards for Consideration of Special Use Permits

Standard: that the establishment, maintenance, or operation of the Special Use will not be detrimental to or endanger the public health, safety, comfort or general welfare.

*The request involves the establishment of a mini warehouse and vehicle rental service at the site. The proposed use is consistent to how the surrounding property has historically been developed with other commercial uses. **Standard is met.***

Standard: That the Special Use will not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of other property in the immediate vicinity for the purposes already permitted, nor substantially diminish and impair property values within the neighborhood.

*The site design and use are consistent with other development in the direct area and should not impact property values. **Standard is met.***

Standard: That the establishment of the Special Use will not impede the normal and orderly development and improvement of the surrounding property for uses permitted in the zoning district.

*Several other commercial uses exist in the direct area. The mini warehouse and vehicle rental service will be developed in accordance with zoning bulk requirements and will not impede adjacent properties. **Standard is met.***

Standard: That adequate utilities, access roads, drainage and/or necessary facilities have been or will be provided.

*Building code and engineering requirements and will be thoroughly reviewed through the permit process. **Standard is met.***

Standard: That adequate measures have been or will be taken to provide ingress and egress so designed as to minimize traffic congestion in the public streets.

*The vehicular access points are existing to the site and should not negatively affect traffic in the area. **Standard is met.***

Standard: That the Special Use shall, in all other respects, conform to the applicable regulations of the district in which it is located, except as such regulations may be modified by the Council pursuant to the recommendations of the Board of Zoning Appeals. (Ordinance No. 2006-137).

The proposed Special Use is subject to, and adherent, with the regulations of the B-1 District. Other applicable site plan development standards including off-street parking, landscape and lighting will be addressed with building permits.

Standard is met.

ADDITIONAL REQUESTS - VARIANCE

Ch 44, 17-9-D, Concurrent Applications (Variances)

The applicant has requested Variances as part of the application, in accordance with Ch. 17, 17-9-D of the site plan review process. The requests are as follows:

The petitioner seeks a Variance from §44-1026-D (Mini warehouse - building height), to allow construction of buildings at 38 feet, 6 inches. §44-1026-D states, "The maximum permitted building height shall be 35-feet or two stories, whichever is less."

Standards for Consideration of Variances

Standard: that the property has physical characteristics that pose unreasonable challenges which make strict adherence to the Code difficult.

*The site has been vacant for several years and will require redevelopment of the entire site. The new buildings will be an additional three feet, six inches, and allow for the function of the storage facility and is consistent with standard industry design. **Standard is met.***

Standard: that the variance would be the minimum action necessary to afford relief to the applicant.

*The variance is required due to the nature of the request to not meet the 35-foot height required by the Code and redevelop the site. **Standard is met.***

Standard: that the special conditions and circumstances were not created by any action of the applicant.

*No special conditions or circumstances were created by the applicant in this situation. **Standard is met.***

Standard: that granting the variation request will not give the applicant any special privilege that is denied to others by the Code.

*No special privilege has been given to the applicant in this situation. **Standard is met.***

Standard: that the granting of the variation will not be detrimental to the public welfare, alter the essential character of the neighborhood, nor unreasonably impair the use of development of adjoining properties.

*There is no expected potential negative impact to the public welfare. The variance would not be expected to alter the character of the neighborhood, nor impair the use or development of adjoining properties. **Standard is met.***

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff finds that the application meets the standards for site plan review and recommends its approval. Staff recommends that the Commission take the following actions:

1. Motion to establish findings of fact that the subject property meets the Legislative Site Plan Review criteria in Chapter 44.17-9 of the City Code and recommend that City Council approve a Site Plan for the property located at 1225 Holiday Drive (PIN: 14-35-451-019, 14-35-451-020, 14-35-451-021) (Ward 5).
2. Motion to establish findings of fact that the subject property meets the Special Use criteria in Chapter 44, 17-7 of the City Code and recommend that City Council approve a Special Use to allow a Mini Warehouse and Vehicle Rental Service in the B-1 (General Commercial) District for the property located at 1225 Holiday Drive (PIN: 14-35-451-019, 14-35-451-020, 14-35-451-021) (Ward 5).
3. Motion to establish findings of fact that the subject property meets the Variance criteria in Chapter 44, 17-9-D of the City Code recommend that the City Council approve a Variance associated with this site plan, to allow construction of buildings at 38 feet, 6 inches, which exceed the 35-foot height requirement for the property located at 1225 Holiday Drive (PIN: 14-35-451-019, 14-35-451-020, 14-35-451-021) (Ward 5).

AMERCO Real Estate Company (AREC) has prepared this application package for the opportunity to receive the City of Bloomington's participation and counseling in regards to a Special Use Permit for the property located at 1225 Holiday Dr. AREC is the wholly owned real estate subsidiary of the U-Haul System.

The proposed 4.08-acre property is located at 1225 Holiday Dr. U-Haul is proposing to develop the site into a U-Haul Moving and Storage Store. Our uses consist of self-storage, U-Haul truck and trailer sharing, and related retail sales. BACKGROUND

Petitioners' request:

The petitioner seeks a Zoning Map Amendment for the subject property from B-1, (General Commercial) District, to R-3B (Multi-Family Residence) District to allow for a multi-family residence. The property is currently owned by the petitioner, Mr. Mark Kudrys, and currently has a commercial unit on the first floor and residential unit above. The petitioner intends to convert the commercial unit into a residential unit and eliminate any commercial use on site. The petitioner may also convert the existing single residential unit into two. With the desire to remove the commercial use, the petitioner is seeking to bring the property into conformance with the zoning code by converting the property to a residential zoning. Given the age of the home and its proximity to the Bloomington Central Business District, the petitioner is requesting the property be zoned R3-B, (Multi-Family Residence) District.

Property Characteristics:

The subject property consists of 0.16 acres of land located at 705 E. Washington Street. The property is located on the south side of E. Washington Street, between N. Clayton Street and N. Clinton Street. The home was constructed circa 1900 as a single family home. It is a two-story brick building, roughly 4,500 square feet and has associated surface parking to accommodate 4 parking spaces. The home was converted into two units, residential above, commercial below, in the late 1970s. The commercial space was utilized for office space. An addition to the home occurred in the 1980s. Until Mr. Kurdey came into ownership of the property roughly 5 years ago, the property had been utilized for residential and office purposes. In the timeframe Mr. Kurdys has owned the property, the first-floor commercial unit has been vacant. The second-floor residential unit has been and is currently, occupied. Neighboring properties are zoned R-3B (Multi-Family Residence) District and B-1 (General Commercial) District.

Notice:

The application was filed in conformance with applicable procedural and public notice requirements. Notice was published in *The Pantagraph* on Monday, April 18, 2022. Courtesy notices were mailed to 101 property owners within 500 feet of the subject property.

ANALYSIS

*Comparison of Existing and Proposed Districts**

Existing Zoning

B-1 (General Commercial) District: The intent of this B-1 (General Commercial) District is to facilitate the development of community and regional commercial areas. The development contemplated in this district has such distinguishing characteristics as unified site planning and development that promotes a safe and conducive atmosphere for large volumes of shoppers; site accessibility such that the high volumes of traffic generated create minimal congestion and adverse impact upon surrounding land use; and unified architectural treatment of buildings rather than an assemblage of separate, conflicting store and structural types.

Proposed Zoning

R3-B (Multiple-Family Residence) District: The R-3B Residence District is intended to allow for increased neighborhood density through the development of small-lot single-family housing, townhomes, duplexes, and multifamily complexes, while being supportive of the overall historic character of the neighborhoods to which it is applied and the preservation of historic structures. A maximum density of 70 dwelling units per acre is permitted. This zoning is applied to areas that are principally on the fringes of the Bloomington Central Business District.

*A list of permitted uses for commercial and residential districts can be found online in [Chapter 44, Divisions 5-1](#) and [4-1](#) respectively.

Compliance with the Comprehensive Plan

Zoning Map Amendment requests should be consistent with the Comprehensive Plan. The 2035 Comprehensive Plan’s Future Land Use map identifies this section of E. Washington Street as Mixed Use. The Land Use Priorities map does not identify this area as a priority area.

The proposed R3-B zoning map amendment supports the following Comprehensive Plan goals:

- N-1.3 Redevelop the neighborhoods in the Preservation area while carefully protecting their historic nature and character.
- H-1.1 Ensure that the housing to accommodate the new growth is a broad range (of types, sizes, ages, densities, tenancies and costs) equitably distributed throughout the

City recognizing changing trends in age-group composition, income, and family living habits.

- H-2. Ensure reinvestment in the established older neighborhoods and compact development of the City.
- H-2.2 Preserve historic homes and structures in the designated Preservation Area.

STANDARDS FOR REVIEW

As indicated in Ch. 44, 17-6 Zoning Map (rezoning) and text amendments, the Planning Commission shall be guided by those purposes, standards, and objectives of this Code and shall not recommend the adoption of any amendment unless it finds that such amendment is in the public interest and not solely for the benefit of the applicant.

Standards for Consideration of Rezoning

The suitability of the subject property for uses authorized by the existing zoning.

Uses permitted within the B-1 (General Commercial) District are primarily oriented towards higher intensity commercial uses. Currently, residential uses are not permitted with B-1 (General Commercial) District. The property has been utilized, as is, since before the zoning code change that prohibited residential uses in B-1 zoning. **The standard is met.**

The length of time the property has remained vacant as zoned considered in the context of land development in the area.

The property has not been entirely vacant. The residential unit is currently rented, but the commercial unit has been vacant for roughly 8 years. The petitioner has been unable to secure a tenant for the commercial unit as there does not appear to be a need for office space in the area. **The standard is met.**

*The suitability of the subject property for uses authorized by the proposed zoning.
The existing land uses and zoning of nearby property.*

A multiple-family dwelling unit is a permitted use in the R3-B zoning district, which is intended for multifamily complexes and other high-density forms of residential uses.. **The standard is met.**

The existing land uses and zoning of nearby property.

The subject property is surrounded by commercial and residential uses. **The standard is met.**

Relative gain or hardship to the public as contrasted and compared to the hardship or gain of the individual property owner resulting from the approval or denial of the zoning amendment application.

If the zoning map amendment is granted, the applicant would be able to utilize the site for purely residential purposes, which would benefit Bloomington residents. **The standard is met.**

The extent to which adequate streets are connected to the arterial street system and are available or can be reasonably supplied to serve the uses permitted in the proposed zoning classification.

The site has access to E. Washington Street. **The standard is met.**

The extent to which the proposed amendment is inconsistent with the need to minimize flood damage and that the development of the subject property for the uses permitted in the proposed zoning classification will not have a substantial detrimental effect on the drainage patterns in the area.

The petitioner is not adjusting any drainage items at the property. **The standard is met.**

The extent to which adequate services (including but not limited to fire and police protection, schools, water supply, and sewage disposal facilities) are available or can be reasonably supplied to serve the uses permitted in the proposed zoning classification.

The site is currently served by existing watermains and sewer connections, as well as fire and police protection. The property is served by District 87 school district. **The standard is met.**

The extent to which the proposed amendment is consistent with the public interest, giving due consideration for the purpose and intent of this Code as set forth in § 44-1701 herein.

The map amendment is intended to facilitate continued operation of the existing residential use, providing a net benefit to the area. **The standard is met.**

The extent to which property values are diminished by the particular zoning restriction.

The zoning restrictions would not be expected to diminish property values. **The standard is met.**

The extent to which the destruction of property values promotes the health, safety, morals, or general welfare of the public.

The proposed rezoning and use are not anticipated to diminish property values in the area. **The standard is met.**

Whether a Comprehensive Plan for land use and development exists, and whether the ordinance is in harmony with it.

The Comprehensive Plan's Future Land Use map identifies the subject property as mixed-use. The Land Use Priorities map does not identify this area. **The standard is met.**

Whether the City needs the proposed use.

The proposed map amendment would allow an existing residentially designed building to be occupied and serve the needs of the citizens. The standard is met.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff finds that the application meets all the standards for a zoning map amendment and recommends that the Planning Commission take the following actions:

1. Motion to establish findings of fact, and that the proposed map amendment is in the public interest and not solely for the benefit of the petitioner.
2. Motion to recommend approval of the petition submitted by Mark Kudrys, requesting a Zoning Map Amendment for the property located at 705 E Washington, from B-1 (General Commercial) District to R-3B (Multi-Family Residence) District. PIN: 21-04-433-004.

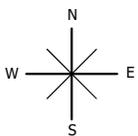
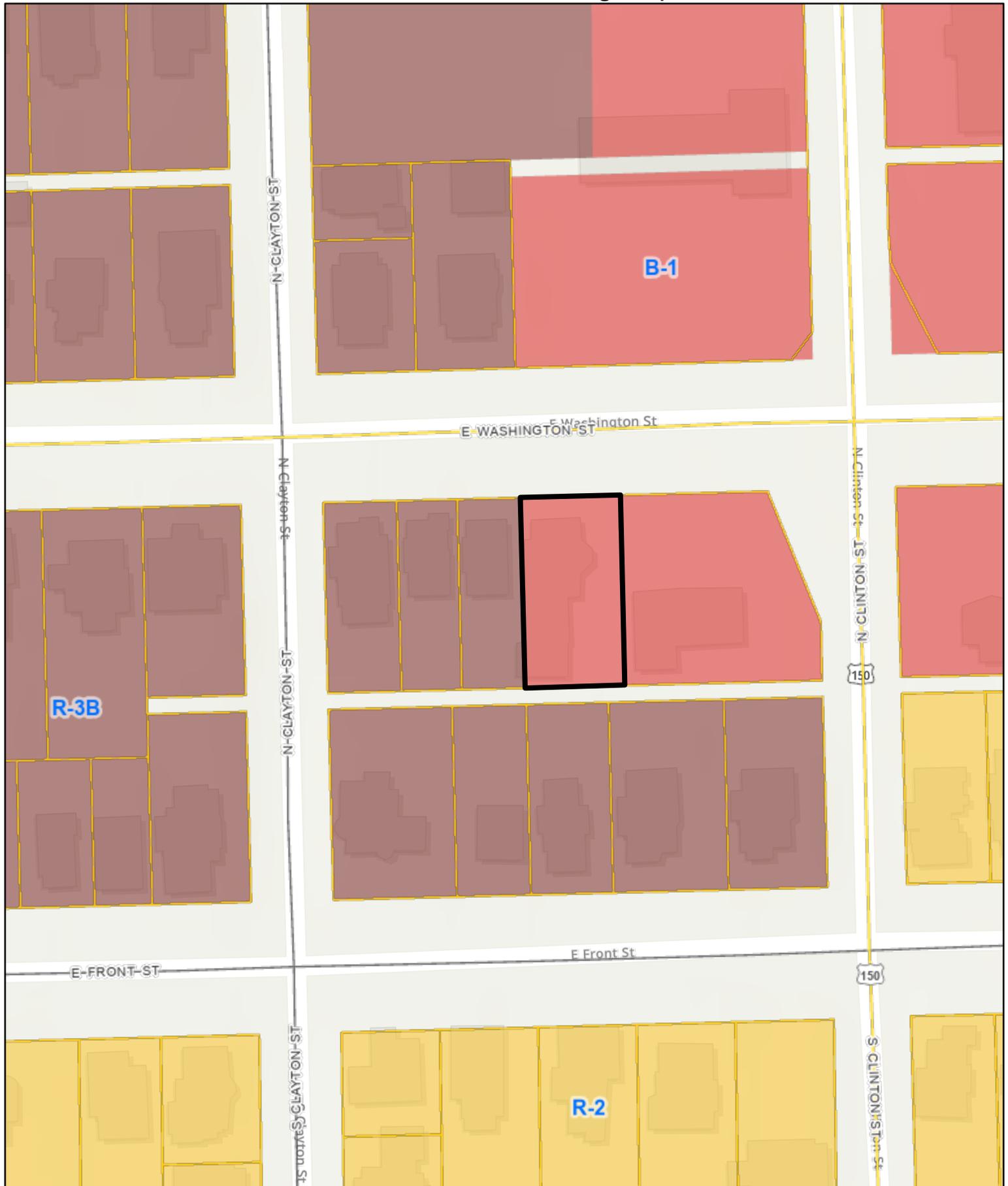
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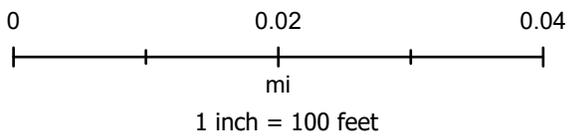
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Case Z-07-22 - Zoning Map

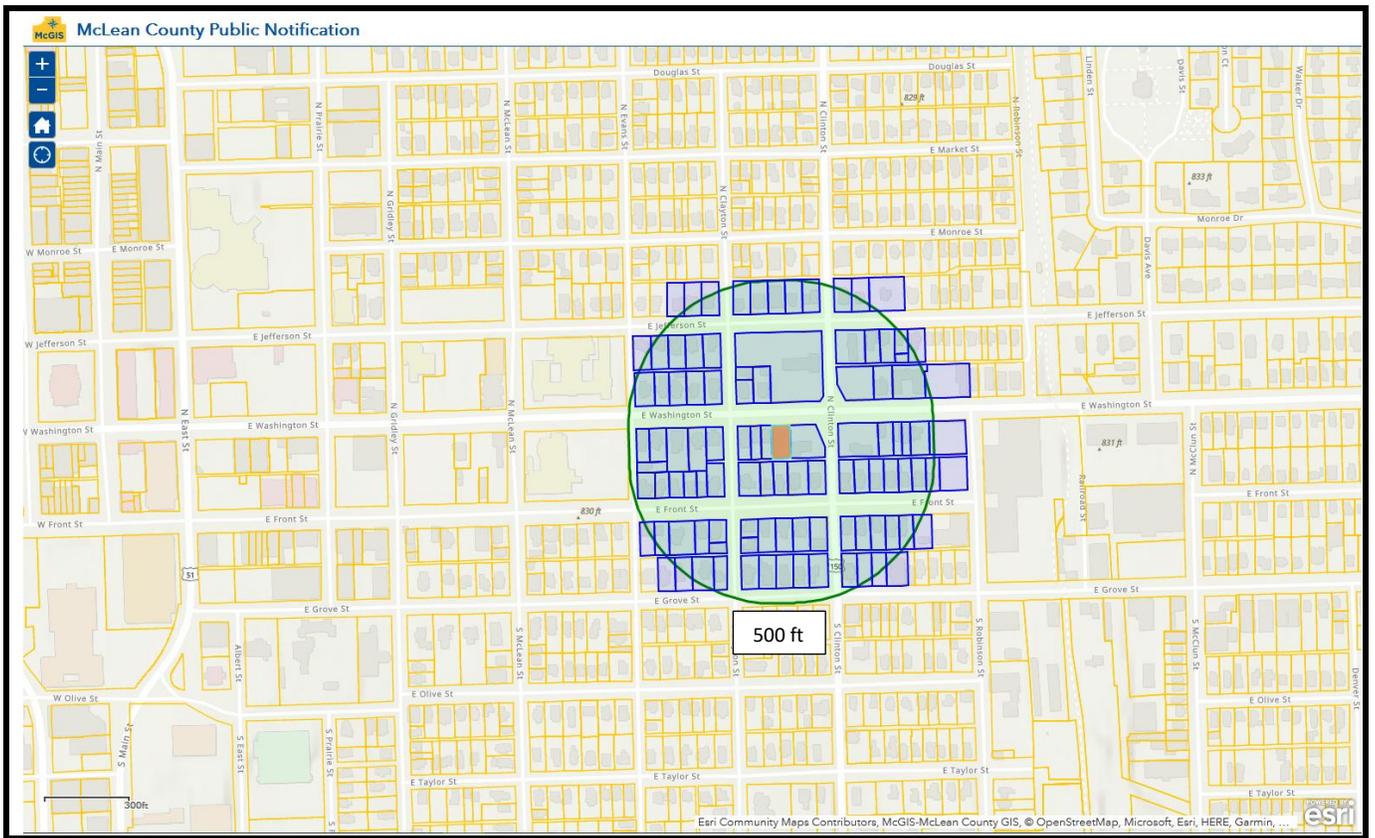

BACKGROUND

Petitioners' request:

The petitioner seeks an Amended Preliminary Plan for the Cedar Ridge Subdivision to allow for the establishment of the Woodrig Business Park. The amended preliminary plan will allow for the subdivision and modification of existing parcels that fall within the preliminary plan to allow for the creation of the business park. Future uses will be predominately storage/warehouses with attached office space. These subdivisions' bulk and site standards are met based upon the current zoning of the properties. Additionally, this amended preliminary plan will serve as the foundation for future development on these properties. Legislative site plan reviews will be required for future development on this property, which is zoned B-1.

Property Characteristics:

The subject property contains approximately 10 acres of land which is currently undeveloped farmland. The amended preliminary plan indicates the existing property will be subdivided and combined into in five (5) lots: Lot 501, Lot 502, Lot 503, Lot 504, Lot 505, and Outlot 500. Access to the property is available from Woodrig Road (Proposed, New) and Breezewood Boulevard (Proposed, New). The surrounding properties are zoned manufacturing, commercial and agricultural. The properties to the South, East and West are located within the County.

The application has been filed in conformance with applicable procedural and public notice requirements. Notice was published in *The Pantagraph* on Monday, April 18th, 2022. Courtesy notices were mailed to 37 property owners within 500 feet of the subject property.

ANALYSIS

Compliance with the Comprehensive Plan:

Preliminary Plans should be consistent with the Comprehensive Plan designation. The 2035 Comprehensive Plan (adopted August, 2015), Future Land Use map, identifies this section of Woodrig Road and Breezewood Boulevard as a commercial activity within the built areas. The Land Use Priorities map identifies this area as a Tier 1 priority, vacant and under-utilized land for infill development or redevelopment within the City.

The proposed Amended Preliminary Plan supports the following Comprehensive Plan goals:

- ED-1.2 Leverage community assets in attracting business.
- ED-4.1 Plan for a diversity of ready-to-build sites to meet the demand.
- ED-4.2 Prioritize infill and redevelopment to spurt growth and reinvestment in the City.
- ED-4.4 Evaluate commercial land use needs in the context of changing economic trends.
- TAQ-1. A safe and efficient network of streets, bicycle-pedestrian facilities and other infrastructure to serve users in any surface transportation mode.

Compliance with the City of Bloomington Municipal Code:

Chapter §24-302F of the Bloomington Code of Ordinances requires the Planning Commission conduct a legislative public hearing on the preliminary plan to determine the extent to which the plan conforms or fails to conform with the standards of this Code.

The Land Subdivision Code of the City of Bloomington was created to address the following purposes:

- A. To protect, provide and promote the public health, safety and general welfare of the City.

The proposed subdivision has access to City utilities, water and sewer, for proper sanitation. Stormwater management is addressed via an adjacent

retention/detention pond. The configuration of the lots are in according with bulk and site standards for the existing zoning district, B-1 (General Commercial) District.

- B. To guide the future growth and development of the City, in accordance with the Comprehensive Plan.

The Comprehensive Plan identifies this section of Woodrig Road and Breezewood Boulevard as a commercial activity within the built areas. The Land Use Priorities map identifies this area as a Tier 1 priority, vacant and under-utilized land for infill development or redevelopment within the City.

- C. To provide for adequate light, air and privacy, to secure safety from fire, flood, and other danger, and to prevent overcrowding of the land and undue congestion of population.

The proposed subdivision provides adequate separation between buildings promoting light and air circulation. The lots and additional infrastructure, as proposed, ensure overcrowding and congestion of the land does not occur. The proposed infrastructure meets the City's design criteria, as outlined in the Manual of Practice.

- D. To protect the character and the social and economic stability of all parts of the City and to encourage the orderly and beneficial development of all parts of the community.

All the lots and the outlot indicated the preliminary plan are currently commercially zoned, B-1 (General Commercial) District. They are adjacent to either commercially, industrially, or institutionally zoned properties. The subject properties are Tier 1 Priority in the City's Comprehensive Plan. Additionally, they are identified as a commercial activity within the built areas. The uses permitted within B-1 (General Commercial) District will be in character with the existing uses surrounding the properties.

- E. To protect and conserve the value of land throughout the City and the value of buildings and improvements upon the land, and to minimize the conflicts among the uses of land and buildings.

The proposed subdivisions and zoning are compatible with adjacent zoning and uses. The proposed use is compatible with adjacent developments.

- F. To guide public and private policy and action in order to provide adequate and efficient transportation, water, sewerage, schools, parks, playgrounds, recreation and other public requirements and facilities.

The properties have access to City services (water and sewer) and have access to existing City streets. There is an existing stormwater detention basin to the southeast of the property that can be utilized for stormwater. The Land Use Priorities map identifies these lots as a Tier 1 priority, vacant and under-utilized land for infill development or redevelopment within the City.

- G. To provide the most beneficial relationship between the uses of land and buildings and the circulation of traffic throughout the City, having particular regard to the avoidance of congestion in the streets and highways, and the pedestrian traffic movements appropriate to the various uses of land and buildings, and to provide for the proper location and width of streets and building setback lines.

The lots proposed have frontage on existing roads. New approaches will be created to ensure multiple points of ingress and egress from the property; this will limit traffic congestion on the properties and ensure traffic easily flows into and off of the property. The new approaches have been reviewed and approved by Public Works and meet the standards outlined in the Manual of Practice. Sidewalks will be installed along Breezewood Boulevard to ensure continuity of existing sidewalks and the neighborhood to the south of the property.

- H. To establish reasonable standards of design and procedures for subdivision codes and resubdivisions, in order to further the orderly layout and use of land, and to insure proper legal descriptions and monumenting of subdivided land.

The Bloomington Subdivision Ordinance and Zoning Code ensure standards for design, establish procedures for subdivision codes and resubdivisions, and final platting; and the proposed preliminary plan follows both.

- I. To ensure that public facilities are available and will have a sufficient capacity to serve the proposed subdivision code and areas reasonably anticipated to be served by such facilities.

The lots can be served by existing city police and fire services. The lots are served by Unit 5 School District. The Tier 1 Priority classification considers access to existing public infrastructure and services.

- J. To prevent the pollution of air, streams, and ponds; to assure the adequacy of drainage facilities; to safeguard the water table; and to encourage the wise use and management of natural resources throughout the City in order to preserve the integrity, stability and beauty of the community and the value of the land.

There is already some stormwater infrastructure provided to the properties in the form of an existing basin to the south. However, a stormwater plan is still required and must be approved by the City Engineering Division.

- K. To preserve the natural beauty and topography of the City and to insure appropriate development with regard to these natural features.

The proposed development should not negatively impact existing natural features such as streams, lakes, or native prairies.

- L. To provide for open spaces through the most efficient design and layout of the land, including the use of average density in providing for minimum width and area of lots, while preserving the density of land as established in the City's zoning ordinance.

The applicant has selected to subdivide the property to ensure development occurs in a manner that meets the density desired by the petitioner, but also ensuring the most efficient layout of the lots and future structures.

Zoning Code (Chapter 44)

Lot characteristics proposed by the subject preliminary plan are in compliance with the requirements of the B-1 (General Commercial) District and supportive of the prescribed site design and development intensities for the Districts.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff finds the proposed Amended Preliminary Plan meets the purpose and intention of Chapter 24 of the City Code and recommends that the Planning Commission take the following actions:

1. Motion to find that the proposed Amended Preliminary Plan meets the purpose and intent of Chapter 24 of the City Code.
2. Motion to recommend approval of the petition submitted by James A Shirk of Sunrise Co., LLC, requesting approval of a Preliminary Plan for Woodrig Business Park, for the property located at 2616 S Main Street. PIN: 21-21-201-012.

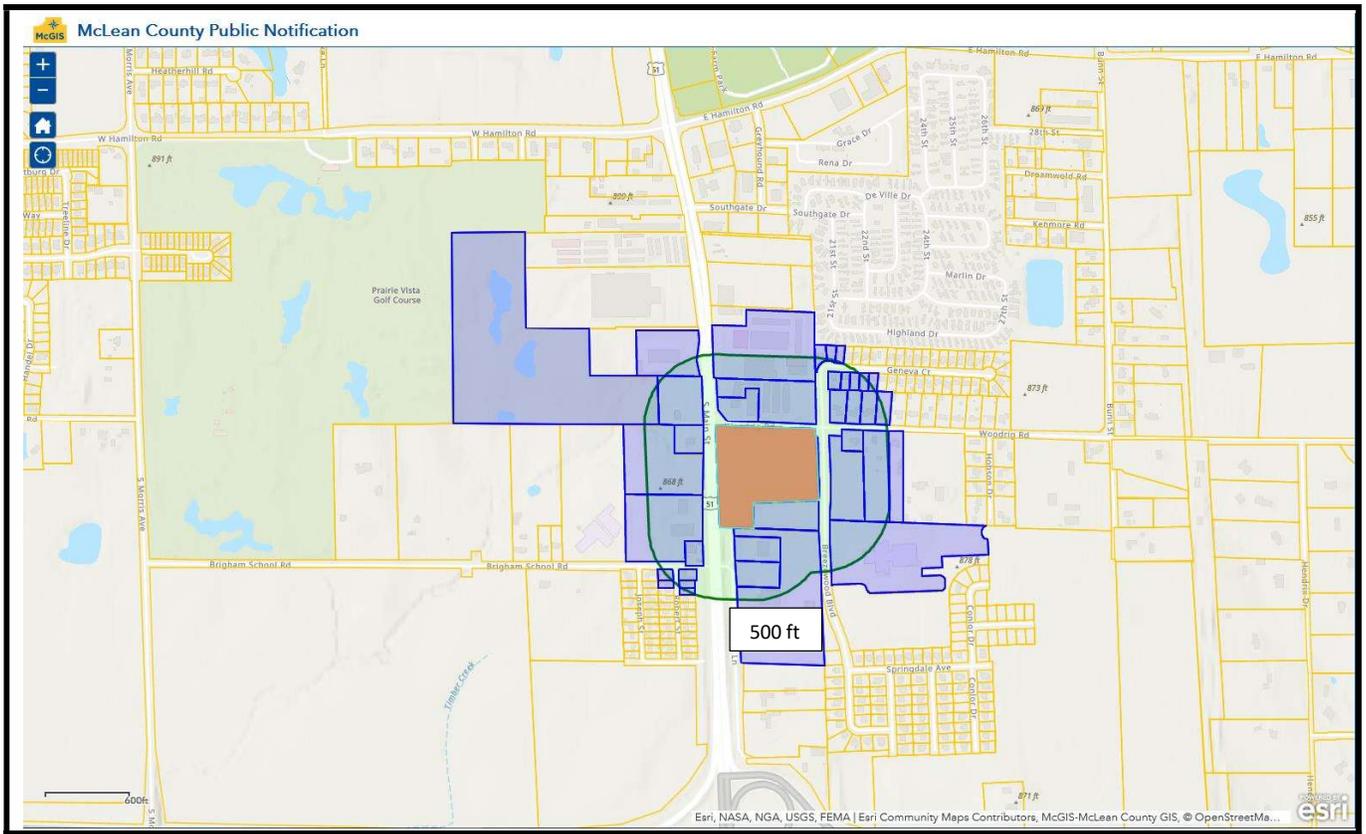

REQUEST: Public hearing, review and action on a request by Greg Goette of Keely Construction on behalf of Bloomington Municipal Credit Union, requesting a Zoning Map Amendment for the property located at 602 S Gridley Street, from C-1 (Office) District and R-3B (Multi-Family Residence) District to B-2 (Local Commercial) District. P.I.N.: 21-04-462-021.

BACKGROUND

Petitioners' request:

The petitioner seeks a Zoning Map Amendment for the subject property, from C-1 (Office) District and R-3B (Multi-Family Residence) District to B-2 (Local Commercial) District, to allow for the construction of a new credit union (bank) building. The property is currently owned by the Bloomington Municipal Credit Union. The property currently consists of the existing credit union building and a vacant lot. The Bloomington Municipal Credit Union recently acquired a neighboring residential lot and combined it with their existing lot. This has resulted in the new parcel having a portion of it zoned C-1 (Office) District and the other portion zoned R-3B (Multi-Family Residence) District. The desire is to have one uniform zoning for the new parcel.

Property Characteristics:

The subject property consists of 0.64 acres of land located at 602 S. Gridley Street. The property is located at the northeast corner of the intersection of S. Gridley Street and E. Oakland Avenue. There is an existing credit union building and associated surface parking area currently existing on the property. The area to the north has been vacant for roughly two and a half years, while the southern portion of the property has been vacant for a considerable time. The existing credit union building will be demolished and a new building will be located closer to the intersection of S. Gridley Street and E. Oakland Avenue. Neighboring properties are zoned R-3B (Multi-Family Residence) District, P-2 (Public Lands and Institutions) District, and M-1 (Restricted Manufacturing) District.

Notice:

The application was filed in conformance with applicable procedural and public notice requirements. Notice was published in *The Pantagraph* on Monday, April 18, 2022. Courtesy notices were mailed to 88 property owners within 500 feet of the subject property.

ANALYSIS

*Comparison of Existing and Proposed Districts**

Existing Zoning

R3-B (Multiple-Family Residence) District: The R-3B Residence District is intended to allow for increased neighborhood density through the development of small-lot single-family housing, townhomes, duplexes, and multifamily complexes, while being supportive of the overall historic character of the neighborhoods to which it is applied and the preservation of historic structures. A maximum density of 70 dwelling units per acre is permitted. This zoning is applied to areas that are principally on the fringes of the Bloomington Central Business District.

C-1 (Office) District: The intent of this C-1 Office District is to accommodate office buildings primarily. Related retail, service, institution, and multiple-family uses commonly associated with office uses are allowed to a limited extent. The prime characteristics of this district are the low intensity of land coverage and the absence of such nuisance factors as noise, air pollutant emission, and glare.

Proposed Zoning

B-2 (Local Commercial) District: The intent of this B-2 Local Commercial District is to provide retail, commercial and service establishments, including retail stores and personal service facilities, which serve the frequently recurring needs of surrounding local employment areas and residential neighborhoods. This district encourages a mix of land uses, continued community investment through infill and site renovations and supports mixed transportation modes. The protection of surrounding residential properties from adverse impacts is a primary focus of this district.

*A list of permitted uses for commercial and residential districts can be found online in Chapter 44, Divisions [5-1](#), and [4-1](#) respectively.

Compliance with the Comprehensive Plan

Zoning Map Amendment requests should be consistent with the Comprehensive Plan. The 2035 Comprehensive Plan’s Future Land Use map identifies this section of S. Gridley Street as an employment center in the built areas. The Land Use Priorities map does not identify this area as a priority area.

The proposed R3-B Zoning Map Amendment supports the following Comprehensive Plan goals:

- ED-1.1 Focus on retention and expansion of existing businesses.

- ED-4.2 Prioritize infill and redevelopment to spur growth and reinvestment in the City.
- N-1.1 Enhance the livability of all Bloomington neighborhoods.

STANDARDS FOR REVIEW

As indicated in Ch. 44, 17-6 Zoning Map (rezoning) and text amendments, the Planning Commission shall be guided by those purposes, standards, and objectives of this Code and shall not recommend the adoption of any amendment unless it finds that such amendment is in the public interest and not solely for the benefit of the applicant.

Standards for Consideration of Rezoning

The suitability of the subject property for uses authorized by the existing zoning.

Uses permitted within the R-3B (Multi-Family Residence) District are primarily oriented for residential uses. Uses permitted within the C-1 (Office) District are primarily oriented for office uses. The Bloomington Municipal Credit Union is a long-standing agency that has survived in harmony with the surrounding properties, thus indicating the location is appropriate for zoning that permits the current use(s). Financial services are a permitted use in C-1 (Office) District, but to have a drive-through a Special Use is required. **The standard is met.**

The length of time the property has remained vacant as zoned considered in the context of land development in the area.

The property has not been entirely vacant. A portion of the property has the existing credit union building. The northern area of the property has been vacant for roughly two and a half years, while the southern are of the property has been vacant for many years. **The standard is met.**

The suitability of the subject property for uses authorized by the proposed zoning.

“Financial services” is a permitted use in the B-2 (Local Commercial) District and a drive-through is a permitted use, unless it is adjacent to a residentially zoned lot. Adjacent lots are zoned residential, so a Special Use will be required. The intent of the B-2 (Local Commercial) District is to provide community investment through infill and site renovations, and to protect the of surrounding residential properties from adverse impacts. **The standard is met.**

The existing land uses and zoning of nearby property.

The subject property is surrounded by commercial, public, and residential uses. **The standard is met.**

Relative gain or hardship to the public as contrasted and compared to the hardship or gain of the individual property owner resulting from the approval or denial of the zoning amendment application.

If the zoning map amendment is granted, the applicant would be able to continue to use the property in its current form, and it would and allow for the construction of a

new credit union building. The location of the new building is more appropriate as it is located closer to the intersection of S. Gridley Street and E. Oakland Avenue; this places the building farther away from residential uses than the existing building is. The updated location will be a benefit to the neighboring residents and is more convenient for the credit union members. **The standard is met.**

The extent to which adequate streets are connected to the arterial street system and are available or can be reasonably supplied to serve the uses permitted in the proposed zoning classification.

The site has access to S. Gridley Street and E. Oakland Avenue. **The standard is met.**

The extent to which the proposed amendment is inconsistent with the need to minimize flood damage and that the development of the subject property for the uses permitted in the proposed zoning classification will not have a substantial detrimental effect on the drainage patterns in the area.

The construction of the new credit union building will require a Stormwater Prevention Plan be provided and approved by Public Works. The plan requires stormwater runoff to be contained on the property. This will be achieved through the creation of a stormwater retention/detention basin. **The standard is met.**

The extent to which adequate services (including but not limited to fire and police protection, schools, water supply, and sewage disposal facilities) are available or can be reasonably supplied to serve the uses permitted in the proposed zoning classification.

The site is currently served by existing watermains and sewer connections, as well as fire and police protection. The property is served by District 87 school district. **The standard is met.**

The extent to which the proposed amendment is consistent with the public interest, giving due consideration for the purpose and intent of this Code as set forth in § 44-1701 herein.

The map amendment is intended to facilitate continued operation of the existing commercial use, while ensuring minimal impact on the surrounding properties, providing a net benefit to the area. **The standard is met.**

The extent to which property values are diminished by the particular zoning restriction.

The zoning restrictions are not expected to diminish property values. **The standard is met.**

The extent to which the destruction of property values promotes the health, safety, morals, or general welfare of the public.

The proposed Zoning Map Amendment and use are not anticipated to diminish property values in the area. **The standard is met.**

Whether a Comprehensive Plan for land use and development exists, and whether the ordinance is in harmony with it.

The Comprehensive Plan's Future Land Use map identifies the subject property as an employment center in the built areas. The Land Use Priorities map does not identify this area as a priority area. The standard is met.

Whether the City needs the proposed use.

The proposed map amendment would allow an existing commercial use to continue to utilize the property to serve the needs of the citizens. **The standard is met.**

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff finds that the application meets all the standards for a Zoning Map Amendment and recommends that the Planning Commission take the following actions:

1. Motion to establish findings of fact, and that the proposed map amendment is in the public interest and not solely for the benefit of the petitioner.
2. Motion to recommend approval of the petition submitted by Greg Goette of Keely Construction on behalf of Bloomington Municipal Credit Union, requesting a Zoning Map Amendment for the property located at 602 S Gridley Street, from C-1 (Office) District and R-3B (Multi-Family Residence) District to B-2 (Local Commercial) District. PIN: 21-04-462-021.

AN ORDINANCE APPROVING A ZONING MAP AMENDMENT FROM C-1 (OFFICE) DISTRICT AND R3-B (MULTI-FAMILY RESIDENCE) DISTRICT TO B-2 (LOCAL COMMERCIAL) DISTRICT FOR THE PROPERTY LOCATED AT 602 S. GRIDLEY STREET.

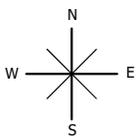
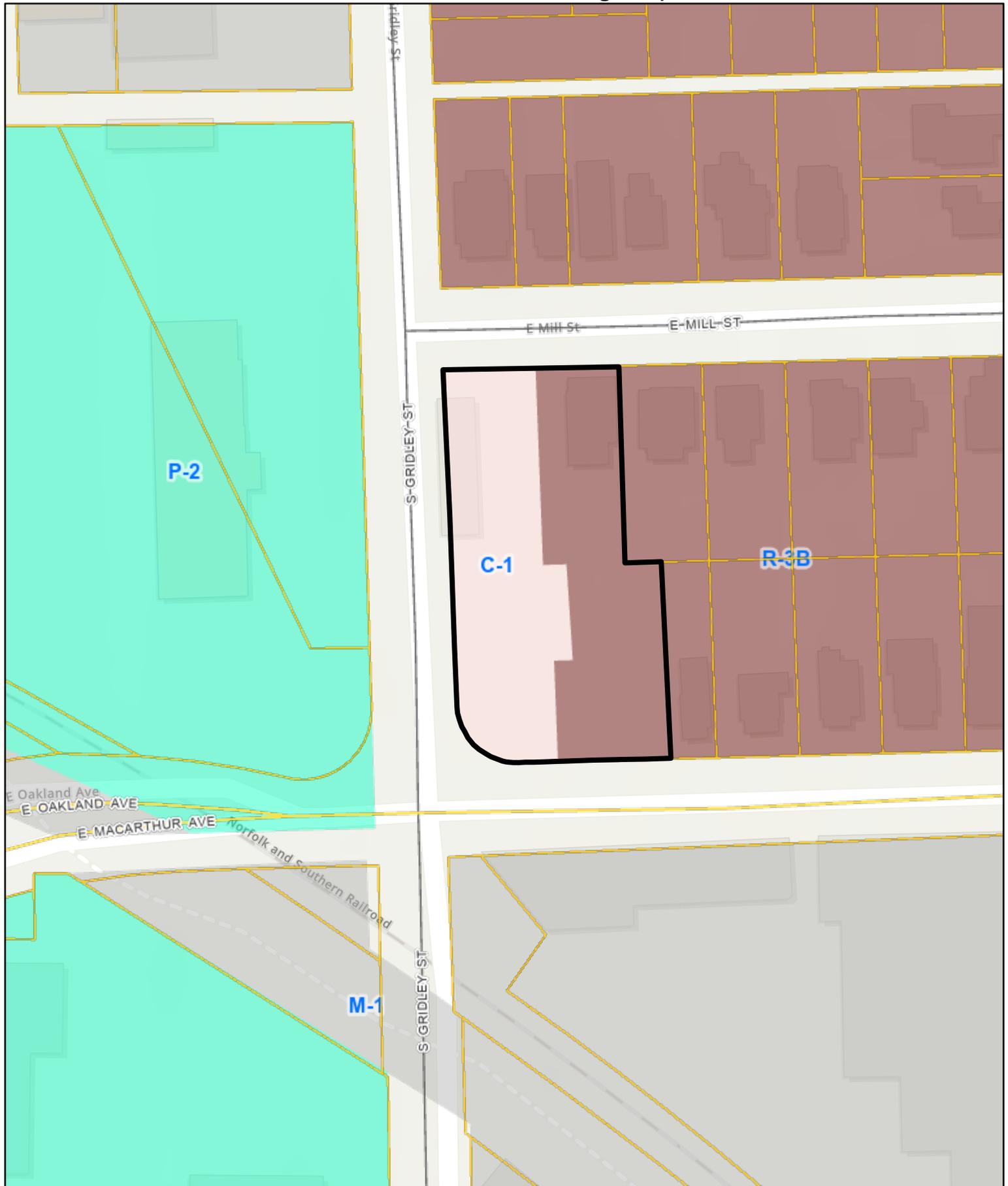
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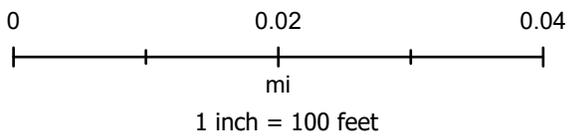
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Case Z-08-22 - Zoning Map
